Recycling Saves Energy

One reason recycling is important is because it saves energy. For example, recycling just one aluminum can saves enough energy to run a television set for three hours. Less energy use means reduced carbon dioxide emissions. Recycling all of your home's waste, newsprint, cardboard, glass, and metal can reduce carbon dioxide emissions by 850 pounds a year.

Also by saving energy, we use less natural resources and fossil fuels. The processing of raw materials makes heavy demands on energy sources. For instance, three percent of America's energy is used for producing packaging products alone.



Recycling paper cuts energy use by 70%, and consumes 60% less water than making new paper. Every pound of steel recycled saves enough energy to light a light bulb for 26 hours. Recycling a ton of glass saves the same as nine gallons of fuel oil. All of these are important to protecting our environment.

Products such as paper, aluminum, glass, plastic, and cardboard can be recycled by households and businesses. Recycling facilities are available at Normal Township Hall, 304 E. Mulberry; University Center, 1101 N. Main; Jewel-Osco, 910 S. Cottage; Kroger, Landmark Plaza; Wal-Mart, 300 Greenbriar; and Normal Public Library, 206 W. College.

An electronics recycling collection is held for computers, monitors, copiers, TVs, VCRs, microwaves, cameras and related equipment. It occurs the 3rd Sunday of each month from 9 am-12 pm at the Public Works Garage at 1301 Warriner Street in Normal.

Recycling can also help keep toxic materials out of landfills. A household hazardous waste collection will be held from 8 am-3 pm on October 5th at the Pekin Mall Parking Lot, 3500 Court St. Call (309)925-5511 for more information.

Normal's Energy Grant to Benefit Area Businesses

As of July 1, the Town of Normal's commitment to economic development and energy conservation deepened due to a two-year Community Energy Program Grant funded by the Illinois Department of Commerce & Community Affairs. Through the Ecology Action Center, the Town of Normal will offer programs for residents, businesses, and students.

The residential program begins with an energy audit and retrofit of the Ecology Action Center, located in a house built in 1865. Its energy makeover will be a dramatic demonstration of the benefits of energy conservation through simple home improvements.

The business program starts with an energy makeover of the Coffeehouse & Deli in downtown Normal. This demonstration project along with targeted workshops over the next two years will help small-to-medium sized businesses improve energy efficiency and reduce utility bills. Rebates will be available to qualified businesses.

The education component includes an Energy School to reach all fifth-graders in Normal, workshops for residents and businesses, tours of the demonstration sites, publications, exhibits, energy fairs, a website, and a speakers bureau.

Alternative Wind Energy in Illinois



Alternative wind energy is promoted as holding numerous benefits for Illinois. The industry created through the construction of windmills in downstate Illinois holds the promise of creating jobs. Also, renewable wind energy promotes national security by reducing the US dependence on foreign markets for energy.

Illinois based NEG Micon manufactures and installs windmills. They plan on having the state's first windfarm at Princeton running by next year. The farm will encompass 3,000 acres while only having to take 20 acres out of agricultural production.

America Recycles Day

America Recycles Day is November 15th. Local activities to celebrate the day include the Reuse and Recycle Art Contest for students K-12. Art work will be on display at the Normal Community High School auditorium from 6:00-7:30 on the 15th. The projects will also be displayed in a fashion show that night. The winners of the 7-12th grade contest will have their work displayed in the lobby of the McLean County Arts Center from November 20-23.

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs and the Illinois America Recycling Association has an America Recycles Day Patch Kit program for grades kindergarten through twelve. The patch kit contains recycling activities that students do to earn a special Illinois Recycles Patch. The patch is different then in the past and now is bright yellow with a blue boarder. A student can still participate in the program even if they have participated before.



Reuse and Recycle Art Contest

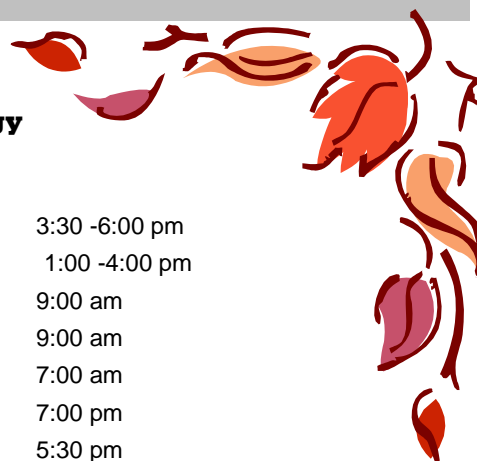
Girl Scouts will earn Recycles Patch
