EAC's Yard Smart Gardens and Upcoming Walk

Did you know the Ecology Action Center's landscape is a Yard Smart demonstration garden? The EAC green space is complete with native species, rain barrels, a rain garden, composting, and is

chemical free. Our space is designed to be an example of a productive, beautiful, and functional yard that protects our water sources by reducing storm water runoff pollution and serves as a safe space for people and animals too. Cathy Bilow from Accent Nature LLC helped design our rain garden and much of our

other current landscaping. She also provides regular landscaping clean-up and ongoing maintenance for the EAC to keep our gardens looking beautiful! When you come by the EAC you'll see Cathy's beautiful designs, along with the EAC's interpretive signage about our rain garden, native plants, the benefits of chemical-free lawns, composting, rain barrels and about being Yard Smart. The 16th annual Yard Smart Garden Walk is on Saturday, June 23, 2018 from 9am – noon. Children and Elders Trees Now Available for Sponsorship

Children and Elders Forest is now accepting sponsors to plant

new trees at Eagle Grove. Eagle Grove is just south of Normal West High School, and adjacent to the west side of Parkside Road. Each sponsor names members of two or more generations in their family and pays the Town \$175. For that fee, the Town buys, plants, maintains,



and replaces any trees that die. CEF stewards will monitor tree tags and labels, do light pruning, and notify the Town regarding any tree health issues. The deadline to sponsor a tree is September 1, 2018.

Yard Smart promotes a healthier more sustainable approach to lawn and garden maintenance. Working with nature to build a balanced ecosystem in both the soil below ground and the yard above ground reduces pollutants that runoff into our local water supply, and produces a more beautiful, sustainable and safer environment for everyone. The program encourages local homeowners to reduce the use of synthetic fertilizers and pesticides, conserve natural resources such as water and fossil fuels, and make room for wildlife in their yards. Yard Smart Certification recognizes local homeowners who use ecologically sustainable practices in maintaining their yards and who realize that their lawn, garden and landscaping decisions affect the health of the whole community.

HHW Update Spring 2018

Spring cleaning means residents are looking to purge their garage or basement of unneeded items. This often means HHW— Household Hazardous Wastes, which can include oil based paints, pesticides, fertilizers, harsh household cleaners, and other materials that are explosive, corrosive, flammable, or otherwise toxic.

As has been the case for several years now, traditional state funding for one-day household hazardous waste collection events is not reliable; that funding is frequently "swept" from the Illinois Solid Waste Fund for other purposes. A quick look at the Illinois EPA website shows no changes in the schedule of HHW events—in fact the most recent event date is from a year ago.

The McLean County HHW Fund is currently on an every-other year schedule. Our last locally-funded event was fall of 2017, which makes our next event likely for fall of 2019.

While we are better meeting the need for proper HHW disposal than most communities in our state, we know it's not good enough. In 2020, EAC plans to conduct a feasibility study for a permanent HHW collection facility to make proper disposal of HHW even easier for McLean County residents so that these materials are not dumped improperly. Bring your children to find out what happens to water bottles in Mclean County. There will be an engaging presentation to show how Midwest Fiber recycles the water bottles that are collected locally.


